January PAC Report

A most interesting fact is that there are over 200 candidates for 50 Aldermanic seats. Only two Alderman are unopposed. In the 15th and 18th Wards there are over 10 candidates for each post. The following weeks before the election, they and their campaign workers will be contacting you, your family and friends asking if they can do anything for you.

A good response would be, “Yes there are a few things.” The city administration should address the under-funding of the police pension. The city has not increased the pension multiplier since 1982. What will the Alderman do to increase funding of the pension?

Also, the current police labor contract will expire at the end of June of 2007. What will the Alderman do to ensure that the police will not have to work more than 2 yrs without a labor contract, which has happened in the two previous contracts.

The Korshak lawsuit concerning the city paying a

percentage of healthcare costs for all city retirees expires on June 30, 2013. The city at that time will not be obligated to pay any health care costs for retirees. What will the Alderman do to protect the well being and medical benefits of the retirees? These are the issues to bring up to your Alderman or the candidates running against them. It's a reasonable conclusion that a few of the aldermen and many of the candidates don't even know about these important issues. You can make them aware of these issues and their answers can help you decide whom to vote for.

Pension News

Tentative Pension Figures for 2006

The estimated return on investment for the fund in 2006 is 12%. This is a major improvement over 2005's return of 7.3%. The fund's international stock and private equity investments were the best performing and have the highest returns.

The fund's actuarial situation was assisted by the fact that there was a large decrease in members retiring in 2006: 328 compared to 430 retirees in 2005. Also approx. 740 recruits were hired in 2006.

In 2005, the Pension Fund's Board of Trustees approved a motion by Trustee Ken Hauser, establishing what is called "The 13th Check Christmas gift." Every year in December, retired Police Officers and widows receiving a monthly annuity of \$1,050 or less for Retired Officers, and \$1,000 or less for widows are sent a check for \$400. This check is mailed out in time for Christmas. This money is taken out of the gift fund. Funding for this account is dependent on donations. Please consider giving to this worthy cause if you can, we are very grateful for any donation given. The Pension Fund does not sell or give your personal information to any person or company, nor solicit you with letters or phone calls requesting further donations.

The Pension Fund would like to thank retired member William Guswiler and his family for their very generous donation to the Gift Reserve Fund.

PENSION NOTES:

In our office we have the original ledger book from when the Police Pension was established in 1887. It is referred to as "The Founders Book".

This is a verbatim entry from Founders Book Sept. 4 1902. This was a special meeting in which numerous Officers were given or denied disability. These are 2 of the cases:

Simon McMahon age 52 years. Was injured while on duty in the haymarket riot. Sustained gunshot injuries to both legs and left arm which will prevent him from doing any active police duty. Will however, be willing to do messenger service.

Herman F. Kruger sustained a gunshot wound of the right knee, and for this reason was put on the retired list. At the present time there is a slight scar where the bullet entered. And in putting the knee in motion a slight crepitation can be felt. Generally speaking however, the knee is in good condition. At the present time he is working as collector for the West Side Brewing Company. A very heavy man weighing 340 pounds and thinks he would be able to work on the patrol wagon. Should recommend him to be returned to the force for some active duty.

Tax Time Approaches

Tax filing season is approaching quickly and now is the time to start thinking about saving money on your income taxes. You do not have to exaggerate expenses or hide income to save on your tax bill. Informed taxpayers can save money on their tax bill simply by taking advantage of the tax laws that are already in place. Following are some of the tax laws that may help you save taxes on your 2006 tax return.

Long Distance Telephone Tax Refund

The IRS recently lost lawsuits concerning their collection of federal tax on long distance telephone service. Taxpayers are entitled to refunds on the long distance taxes paid between March 2003 and July 2006. One can use the actual amounts paid or a standard refund amount based on the number of exemptions. This applies to both cellular and land line telephones.

Energy Credits

Several tax acts passed in 2005 will apply to your 2006 tax return. If you have installed qualifying energy efficient property in your personal residence, you can claim up to a \$500 credit. The \$500 credit is a

one-time credit that can be spread over 2006 and 2007 depending on when the property was placed in service. The credit is calculated depending on the type of qualifying property. Qualifying improvements receive a 10% of cost credit while qualifying purchases receive a 100% of cost credit limited by a maximum dollar amount based on the type of property. These dollar limits are \$50 for certain fans, \$150 for certain furnaces and \$300 for qualified heat pumps, central air units and water heaters.

These are just a few ways to save taxes in 2006. Professional tax preparers are well versed in these and other ways for you to save taxes. If you have been content with deducting range and uniform costs and mileage to and from court, it may be time to have a professional review your tax return.

Chicago Police Memorial Foundation

“And once again I am not forgotten...”

These are the words of Officer Cedric Brumley who in the early morning hours of 16 August 2002 did not forget about another Officer calling for help as he lie wounded from a gunshot.


While on his way to a 10-1, Cedric was involved in a vehicle crash, which would forever change his life. Cedric, who was on his way to help a fellow officer fight for his life, now found himself in a hospital bed fighting for his own. Cedric is now a paraplegic. He has had to leave the job he loved, and has had to learn to live a life faced with challenges that he had never imagined, but if you ask Cedric if he would do it all again, his immediate answer is “yes”. On 16 August 2002 Officer Cedric Brumley did not forget that when a brother or sister Officer calls for help you go! No questions asked! That is what family does.

The Chicago Police Memorial Foundation began its mission in April of 2004 to build the finest law enforcement memorial in the country for Chicago's fallen heroes. Less than three years later that dream became a reality with the opening of Gold Star Families Memorial and Park. Now the Foundation looks to its “Mission Beyond the Memorial”. We want to start that mission by continuing to always remember the tremendous sacrifices that Chicago Police Officers make for this city. During a payroll contribution presentation to a recruit class a young recruit came forward and asked, “Will there be a place in the Park for officers like Jim Mullen, Cedric Brumley, Andre Van Vegten, and Det. Joseph Airhart?”. These are all Chicago Police Officers who have been catastrophically injured in the line of duty. Sgt. Murphy, who had been making the presentation just stared silently at the recruit for a short time and then replied, “Yes”. The thing is, there was not a space in the park for these Officers. I'm embarrassed to say that it had slipped past everyone in the planning of the Park. But as the Sgt. thought about the recruits question he realized that there could be no other answer but yes. So the “Living Sacrifice”

space was created to remember, to never forget, these brave heroes. No questions asked.

To date the Foundation has made a \$5,000.00 contribution to the Mother of Officer Eric Solorio who was killed in a traffic crash. There have been several \$2,000.00 gifts to surviving family members of Officers who have tragically taken their own lives. And \$10,000.00 has been donated to Officer Cedric Brumley to aid him in purchasing a specially equipped van. But believe me when I tell you, this is just the tip of a very large iceberg. With the continued support of the Chicago Police Department, its Officers, the community, and businesses, we are preparing ourselves for many more wonderful undertakings.

So now we continue onward in our efforts. Our continued fundraising will not only go toward the upkeep and maintenance of the Park, but into answering our Officers calls for help. Phase 2 of the Memorial Brick campaign has been an overwhelming success but still we are receiving calls and letters daily requesting that we extend the program just a little while longer. Again the Foundation answers the call of its Officers. I am delighted to announce that we will be extending Phase 2 until 01 March 2007. These bricks come with a lifetime guarantee and are only \$100.00 dollars each. So if you are one of those who have wanted to get a brick in the Park for all to see, as well as, contribute to the upkeep of the Park and the Mission Beyond the Memorial at the same time, then Hurry. Have you ever tried to figure out why people will pay fifty dollars to get into an amusement park so that they can rides that scare them silly and raise their stress level to the max? Yet, the amusement parks would go out of business if it didn't have rides that sent your stress level off the chart. We pay, and pay big, to be beat to death in a little cart dropping off a hill and flipping us upside down two or three times stopping just in time for most people to catch their stomach.

On the other hand, let some outside stress come into life, something we didn't pay for, and suddenly the world is coming to an end. Since everyone says we can't have stress, or at least not the kind we don't pay for, then we must have a fix.

"Doctor, help me with my stress, my burden; order for me a vacation, some place to escape.. Please."
"Can't do that? Well -- maybe a pill? A medicine???"

Why is it that we can be so brave and tough on the roller coaster and be so whimsy and whinny when the boss wants the job done by the end of the day? Actually, I've done a little research on this matter. I think I have come up with four simple reasons why "unpaid for" stress gets us down so quickly.

\$3,000 Gift to Retirees

A majority of retirees received a letter from the Pension Fund relative to a \$3000 dollar deduction. This is the result of “The Pension Protection Act of 2006” aka HR-4. This bill was introduced by U.S. Rep. John Boehner, and can be found on the internet or by going to the Library of Congress on the net. The Act consists of 376 pages (very confusing), & we are found on page 197. I spoke to several people from the Pension Fund, and some of the reasons for asking you to sign the wavier are that the IRS states you must give permission to the Pension Fund to administer the deduction, also, the Pension Fund is administrating the deduction and they must protect the Pension Fund if you or your tax preparer make a mistake or you improperly use the deduction. To the best of my knowledge there is no reason not to sign the wavier. The wavier “a term police officers hate” is not written in the best format. The wavier that you received is being used by other pension funds nationally. This wavier assists the Pension Fund in establishing a record of those who responded and should receive the deduction. It will come in the form of a “1099”, which will be deducted from your gross income. You can use this deduction when you file your 2007 taxes in the year 2008. This applies only to retirees whose medical benefits are being paid by the Pension Fund. I retired at age 60 and the City pays my medical benefits so I do not receive the benefit. Additionally, it can only be used by police or fire retirees. If your spouse is not either, then it does not apply to them. If you don't sign the waiver you don't get the deduction. If you threw it out you can download another form from the Pension website. Go to the links on the Sgt's website. It's a good deal; take advantage of it, good luck and good health. 🏠

Are You Turning 65???

At least three (3) to four (4) months before you turn age 65 you should contact the Social Security Administration and apply for your Medicare Benefits and CARD. When you receive your Medicare CARD, immediately submit a copy of the CARD to the Pension Fund. NOW, if you retired after age 60 the City pays for your medical benefits. When you turn 65, you are automatically enrolled in the Retiree's Plan. If for some strange reason you do not want to be enrolled in the Retiree's Plan you must notify them at least 31 days before you turn 65. If there is no Medicare Card on file you will pay a higher premium. When you are 65, Medicare is your primary insurance and Blue Cross Blue Shield is your secondary. TIP-if you don't have 40 quarters you might be able to borrow quarters from your spouse. Check with your social security office. Carol Lopez and Sgt. Mike Lazzaro from the Pension Board contributed to this article. 🏠
